Why: Hospital CEOs and other leaders in Marion County have acknowledged the disproportionate outcomes in health practices that have put people of color at risk. We will hear from Hospital CEOs working to deal with those concerns, as well as Vop Osili, President of the Indianapolis City-County Council, who has acknowledged that "Racism is a Public Health Crisis."

As advocates in educating our community about issues the community faces, the NAACP and the Indianapolis Recorder commend our local medical health care hospital CEOs for their public stance in acknowledging the problem and pledging to create a "culture of inclusion." Health officials have stated their determination to reduce the health disparities and inequities that so many African American and other historically disenfranchised communities face when they interact with the health care system. At the forum, we will explore several important questions such as: What resources and strategies do they currently utilize, and will they utilize, to eliminate racism in their institutions?
